CANCER COMMITTEE REPORT

2010 was a very active year for the Affinity Health System cancer program. The program continues to be recognized and accredited by the American College of Surgeons with commendation, and early this year we learned that the program received another three year accreditation with commendation. Certainly this reflects the continued exceptional efforts of many people including the Registry Staff, Administrative Staff, and everyone involved in clinical care of our patients with cancer. I would give special thanks and credit to Nancy Sonnleitner, registry coordinator, whose high degree of professionalism and dedication was crucial in achieving this goal, and my colleagues at Fox Valley Hematology Oncology who continue to unselfishly contribute time and talents to the dedication of AHS.

Since 2006, there has been a 38% increase in the number of cancer cases at St. Elizabeth's hospital. Cancer has become more and more a chronic disease. Advancement in diagnostic capability remains crucial to the expansion of our programs. AHS St. Elizabeth's campus is currently undergoing renovation, and continues to strive toward improvement in care. Expanded treatment areas, exam rooms, and a dedicated parking and drop-off entrance is being planned to provide easy access, privacy, and comfort to our patients. A new healing garden, a tranquil, comforting space to assist in the patient's holistic recovery is planned for 2011.

Radiation Oncology continues to offer advanced radiotherapy techniques. This has been with the cooperation of Green Bay Radiation Oncology, and Dr. Robert Kohl. Dr. Kohl has been instrumental in the development of mammosite, low dose and high dose brachytherapy, radiosurgery techniques, and tomotherapy.

Robotic surgery for prostate cancer patients is available at St. Elizabeth's Hospital. We are hopeful this type of surgery will continue to expand to a larger scope of patients. The Pathology department with the respected assistance of Dr. Peter Podlusky has incorporated CAP protocol templates for cancer pathology reports. The tireless effort of all the Pathologists to greatly enhance our program is appreciated at every level of cancer care.

Fox Valley Hematology and Oncology (FVHO) continue to provide clinical trial availability for our patients, and the ability to monitor our performance system wide to assure that our goals of excellence are achieved. FVHO is one of 16 cancer groups recognized by the American Society of Clinical Oncology as being a certified member of the Quality Oncology Program Initiative (QOPI). Our relationship with University of Wisconsin Madison and the respected Carbone Cancer Center remains strong.

Ongoing efforts by our local YMCA for the development of a LIVESTRONG program, with emphasis is also being placed on the mind, body, and spirit aspect of patient well being will hopefully be launched in early 2011. A new focus of the planning will be on Integrative

Medicine in the near future, and has received special attention by Affinity Health System's program of excellence.

With regard to our quality assurance within the Cancer Committee at AHS, we continue to closely monitor our compliance with established national guidelines for the workup, treatment and follow-up of patients with cancer. These national guidelines are critical to assuring that cancer care is standardized nationwide and that every patient receives high level of care in our community when compared to a major academic center.

These are challenging times in our profession. Breast Center

The Affinity Health System Breast Centers are accredited by the American College of Radiology and certified by the FDA Mammography Quality Standards Act. Accreditation and certification are awarded for facilities that achieve high practice standards after peer-review evaluation of its practice. Evaluations are conducted by board-certified physicians, medical physicists and trained site surveyors who are experts in the field of mammography. They assess the qualifications of the personnel and the adequacy of facility equipment through records review, equipment testing and process review. The surveyors report their findings and subsequently provide the practice with a comprehensive quality report. This is an annual process.

The AHS Breast Centers utilize computer assisted detection technology, the R2 Imagechecker® that increases the chance of finding small cancers (in the earliest stages) by 20%. The R2 Imagechecker® system assists radiologists with their review of screening mammograms by identifying areas on the mammogram containing features that may be associated with cancer and therefore warrant further attention.

Cancer Resource Centers

The resource center provides for a centralized area of cancer information. It is located on the first floor of St. Elizabeth Hospital and Suite 200 in Mercy Oakwood in Oshkosh. Services include brochures and pamphlets for specific cancer information, wigs, turbans and scarves. The center is open from 6am-9pm daily.

Appointments for wig fittings can be made with our Affinity Health System/American Cancer Society Navigator at 831-8547.

Case Management

The Case Management Department provides services to cancer patients who are hospitalized. These services include, but are not limited to, individual/family support, financial direction, community resource coordination, and meeting discharge needs such as arranging for home health care services/Hospice services, durable medical equipment or alternative living situations. Case Managers are directed by physician

leadership as well as working with other physicians, providers, nurses and staff, to promote continuity of care.

Case Management provides individualized patient focus utilizing an interdisciplinary approach coordinated across the continuum of care to achieve the best outcomes by promoting continuity of care from hospital to home, or alternate residential setting.

Health Science Library

The Clark Family Health Science Library at Mercy Medical Center and The Resource Café at St. Elizabeth Hospital is open to the public and welcomes patients and their families. Resources include books, journals, audio-visual materials, computer databases, internet access to the National Cancer Institute and other quality sites, as well as the assistance of a professional librarian. A special library book cart is made available at “Living with Cancer” support group meetings and other support groups for check-out of materials. Photocopy services are available and all library services are provided free of charge to patients and their families.

Hospice and Palliative Care

Affinity Health System has a Palliative Care Team that provides multidisciplinary consultations to cancer patients at any point of their diagnosis for:

- Advance Care Planning by trained RESPECTING CHOICES facilitators
- Counseling for understanding the illness history, disease process, and treatment goals
- Pain and symptom management
- Support of the family and caretakers

To reach Palliative Care Services, call (920) 996-4823.

When the patient chooses to discontinue curative therapy and the prognosis is six months or less, referral is made to Affinity Hospice where multidisciplinary care continues to provide the above services. To reach Affinity Hospice, call (920) 996-4800.

Both Hospice and Palliative Care Teams have:

- A medical director

- Nurses with special training in end-of-life care (most are EPEC certified, many are board certified in hospice and palliative nursing) and pain management
- Chaplains
- Social workers
- Dietitians, pharmacists, OT, PT, and other health care professionals as needed
- * Grief counselors

Every patient followed is staffed at a team meeting every two weeks. Both teams can follow patients wherever they are staying, be it in the hospital, in a nursing home, or at home.

The goal of Hospice and Palliative Care is to provide the best possible quality of life while living with a life threatening illness.

Laboratory Services

Affinity Health System maintains a full service laboratory. The services include chemistry, hematology as well as microbiology. The pathology service is available on a full time basis. Tissue diagnoses are performed on site. The Department of Histology can use immunoperoxidase stains for further delineation of tumors. Estrogen and Progesterone receptor studies are now performed in the laboratory for better patient care. The department has expanded its surveillance program for cervical cancer by incorporating the ThinPrep® cytology technique.

The department is a significant part of the Cancer Conference for discussion of individual patient care regimens. The department is also concerned with community education through its involvement with the Cancer Care Committee. Both the Department of Microbiology and the Department of Pathology are intimately involved in infection control. The department also participates in the CME accredited educational programs for the physician community. The laboratory maintains a school of medical laboratory technology in which both the pathologists and laboratory personnel take an active teaching role. An active role is also maintained in the quality improvement initiatives for the hospital as well as for transfusion services.

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Medical Nutrition Therapy

Qualified nutrition professionals (Registered Dietitians and Dietetic Technicians, Registered) are available to provide medical nutrition therapy to oncology patients in both the inpatient and outpatient settings. Medical nutrition therapy may include identification of nutrition risk, assessment of nutritional status, nutrition care planning and nutrition education.

Inpatient Services: All patients are screened for nutrition risk. Patients identified to be at risk are assessed and a nutrition plan of care identified and implemented. The patient-specific nutrition plan of care may include modification of the prescribed diet, incorporation of food preferences, evaluation of oral intake, use of oral nutritional supplements, symptom management, nutrition education and/or initiation and monitoring of nutrition support (enteral or parenteral nutrition).

The medical nutrition therapists (RD or DTR) collaborate with the medical staff, nursing service, pharmacy, therapists and case managers, as well as the patient and family, to provide optimal nutrition therapy. An integral component of this collaborative care is participation in Cancer Conference and Nutrition Support Team rounds.

Outpatient Services: A registered dietitian is available for consultation in the Fox Valley Hematology & Oncology office located on the St. Elizabeth Hospital campus as well as the Radiation Oncology Department. Patients identified to be at nutrition risk are scheduled for individual consultation.

Community Services: A registered dietitian periodically offers a nutrition class to address topics such as maintaining adequate nutrition during treatment, guidelines for moderating treatment-associated side effects impacting nutrition, and the role of nutritional and herbal supplements. Community support groups such as Living with Cancer and the Ostomy Club occasionally invite a registered dietitian to speak.

Medical Oncology – FVHO

Fox Valley Hematology & Oncology, S.C., is an independent group of specialty physicians' board certified in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer and blood disorders. Offices are staffed five days a week with 24 hour coverage. Many chemotherapy treatments are given in our offices on an

outpatient basis; providing efficient cost-effective patient care. Hematology and chemistry blood testing is performed in our laboratory reducing wait time and eliminating the need for our patients to visit multiple departments. Our physicians also travel to several outlying communities reducing the need for patients to travel to receive healthcare.

Navigator Program

The patient navigator program, a collaborative program with the American Cancer Society, offers free, confidential assistance to cancer patients and those who care for them. Navigators are trained to listen and learn the individual's needs and create an individualized plan for them.

Navigators provide a broad range of services including:

- Providing extensive cancer care information.
- Assisting in locating local and national resources.
- Arranging for durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers and beds.
- Coordinates transportation and lodging.
- Connects patients with wigs, hats and other prosthetic resources.

NurseDirect

Affinity *NurseDirect* is a state-of-the-art, computer based, nurse triage "Telehealth", communication hub, call center for Affinity Health System (AHS), serving all customers of the Fox River Valley.

Affinity *NurseDirect* is a free service, where customers can call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, when they have health-related questions, concerns, need help finding a physician or wish to sign-up for AHS related educational events. Callers speak directly to a registered nurse or other health professional.

Affinity *NurseDirect* has a Health Information Library, which is an audio library on more than 1,400 pre-recorded health topics. The audio library features allow providers to individually record profiles or practice specific information topics, which can be accessed by anyone, at any time.

Oncology Nursing

At Affinity Health System a collaborative and holistic approach is

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used when caring for the cancer patient. Support is given to the patient, family, friends and team members. The oncology nurse interacts with the physician, case manager, social worker, dietitian, clergy and others when planning and evaluating care. Patient rights are respected and patients are encouraged to be active participants in their care. Patients are cared for both on an inpatient and outpatient basis. Outpatient services include the administration of blood products and chemotherapy. The oncology staff nurses all receive a basic oncology and a chemotherapy administration course. Continuing education is encouraged as is national certification. Currently five nurses have taken and passed the National Examination for Certification as an Oncology Nurse.

Patient Financial Services

Patient Financial Services department participates in a multidisciplinary team approach to provide support and financial services to our cancer patients and their families. The hospital has six trained financial counselors available to assist patients, their families, and physicians with the technicalities of understanding insurance, disability benefits and medical financial planning.

Realizing the impact cancer can have on patients and their families, our counselors empathize and assist with the various stages and issues related to the cancer experience. A variety of services are offered including financial counseling, assistance with disability paperwork, medical bill management, and information regarding community resources.

Pharmacy Services

Affinity Health System Pharmacy is open 24 hours daily to provide the medication needs of our cancer patient population. Services include all inpatient and outpatient medications as well as specialized pain management needs while at home. Home IV medication needs are provided through affiliated Home Care pharmacists. Pharmacists are available 24 hours daily for medication information, consultation, and medication monitoring.

Radiation Oncology

The Radiation Oncology Department is able to offer its patients an array of services. Radiation therapy (external beam radiation treatment) is performed on a Varian CL21EX Linear Accelerator (providing dual energy photons and 5 electron energies). CT image based conformal radiation

treatment planning is performed in preparation for most courses of treatment. The Radiation Oncology section is also equipped with a state-of-the-art Treatment Simulator and a Record and Verify Computer Information System with digital imaging and archive capabilities.

Radiology Services

Affinity Health System maintains a full service Radiology department. We offer state-of-the-art treatment to both inpatients and outpatients. Our services include Diagnostic Radiology, MRI, CT, Ultrasound, Nuclear Medicine, PET/CT and Interventional Radiology including Heart Catheterizations. Diagnostic Radiology is available 24 hours per day seven days a week; other services are offered Monday through Friday with call coverage for off-hours. The PET/CT is a mobile service offered one day per week every other week.

Spiritual Services Department

The Spiritual Services Department offers pastoral and spiritual ministry to cancer patients, their families and staff. In addition to offering a listening presence, spiritual and emotional support, the Spiritual Services Department assists patients and families in finding meaning in their current life situation. As part of the integrated health care team we care for the mind, body and spirit. Chaplains empower patients to use their spiritual resources as part of their plan of care. Catholic and Protestant worship services are available through closed circuit TV. The Sacraments of Communion, Anointing and Reconciliation are available to patients in their faith tradition. Our department is involved in the Cancer Committee, the Cancer Concerns Committee and Radiology Oncology Clinic.

Social Work

Affinity Health system has a social worker available to assist oncology patients and their families on an inpatient and outpatient basis. The social worker provides an array of services which include, but are not limited to, emotional support, assessment of psychosocial needs/concerns, connection with community resource/supports, assistance with financial stressors and the disability process, transportation needs, etc. The social worker is part of the medical team and collaborates with other professionals, the patients and their families for improved continuity of care.

SUPPORT GROUPS

Breast Cancer Recovery Foundation

BCRF provides *Infinite Boundaries* retreats for breast cancer survivors addressing the physical, emotional, and spiritual components necessary for healing and survival. Additional information on upcoming retreats is available through the BCRF web page www.bcrf.org. Scholarships are available for women who would like to attend a retreat but are unable to do so because of financial reasons.

Living with Cancer

Living with Cancer is a support group for cancer patients and their families to help each other and learn ways to deal with pain, loneliness and stress associated with living with cancer. The group meets the second and fourth Wednesday of every month at 6:30 p.m. at St. Elizabeth Hospital in the Helen Fowler Conference Center.

Look Good...Feel Better

This program helps women living with cancer improve their appearance and self-image by teaching hands-on beauty techniques to help them overcome side effects of chemotherapy and radiation treatment. Free.

Group Program

Volunteer beauty professionals lead small groups, usually consisting of six to ten women, through practical, hands-on experience. Women learn about makeup techniques, skin care, nail care and options related to hair loss such as wigs, turbans and scarves. Each group program participant receives a free kit of cosmetics for use during and after the workshop.

One-on-One Salon Consultations

For patients who are unable to attend a group workshop, a free, one-time, individual salon consultation with a volunteer cosmetologist may be available in your area. These trained beauty experts help each patient address her specific skin, hair and related appearance needs.

Self-Help Materials

Self-help materials can be obtained free of charge by request through the Look Good... Feel Better toll-free number, 1-800-395-LOOK. The self-help materials include a 30-minute video entitled "Look Good... Feel Better Just for You," a step-by-step instructional booklet and an evaluation form. The video tape features cancer survivors and volunteers discussing appearance-related side effects of cancer treatment, as well as detailed skin care information, "how to" makeup tips, wig information and pointers on head coverings. The companion booklet also covers nail care. Materials are also offered in Spanish, and bilingual programs are available in some areas.

Program Background

Look Good... Feel Better program was founded and developed in 1989 by the Cosmetic, Toiletry and Fragrance Association (CTFA) Foundation, a charitable organization supported by the cosmetic industry, in cooperation with your American Cancer Society (ACS) and the National Cosmetology Association (NCA), a national organization that represents hairstylists, wig experts, estheticians, makeup artists and other professionals in the cosmetic industry. All cosmetology volunteers attend a four-hour certification class in order to become a Look Good... Feel Better volunteer.

Look Good... Feel Better is product neutral. Volunteers and program participants do not promote any cosmetic product line or manufacturer. All cosmetics used in the group program have been donated.

The Fox Valley Ostomy Chapter meets the first Wednesday of February, April, June, August, October and December at 7 p.m. at Mercy Medical

Center in Conference Room A, as well as the first Thursday of February, April, June, August, October and December at 7 p.m. at St. Elizabeth Hospital in the Helen Fowler Conference Center. It is a satellite of the United Ostomy Association, which is the National Organization.

The meeting is conducted in an Educational style setting. There are approximately 20-25 members attending. The purpose of the meeting is to offer support, education, reassurance, resources, personal experiences, professional attention, and socialization.

There is a time for sharing among the group but there is also time when 1:1 counseling or attention is given by the enterostomal therapist or the registered nurse.

Man-to-Man Support Group

Education and support evolved from concern expressed by men that they needed education and support for prostate cancer. This group is unique in that the group encourages spouses and significant others to attend all meetings, whereas other groups are for "Men Only". The group is facilitated by registered nurses, office staff, and a prostate cancer survivor. Success of this group cannot be measured. The education, emotional support and laughter aids the recovery process. This is an educational support group for men diagnosed with prostate cancer in order to learn about diagnosis, treatment and techniques for coping with the emotional impact of this disease.

The group meets the fourth Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m., alternating between St. Elizabeth Hospital and Appleton Medical Center. Call NurseDirect at 738-2230 for location, date and time.

You Are Not Alone (YANA)

YANA is designed for women age 40 or younger who are coping with breast cancer. The group meets the third Monday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at Appleton Medical Center. For more information, contact Mindy Brandmeyer at (920) 380-1500.

Community Cancer Support Group

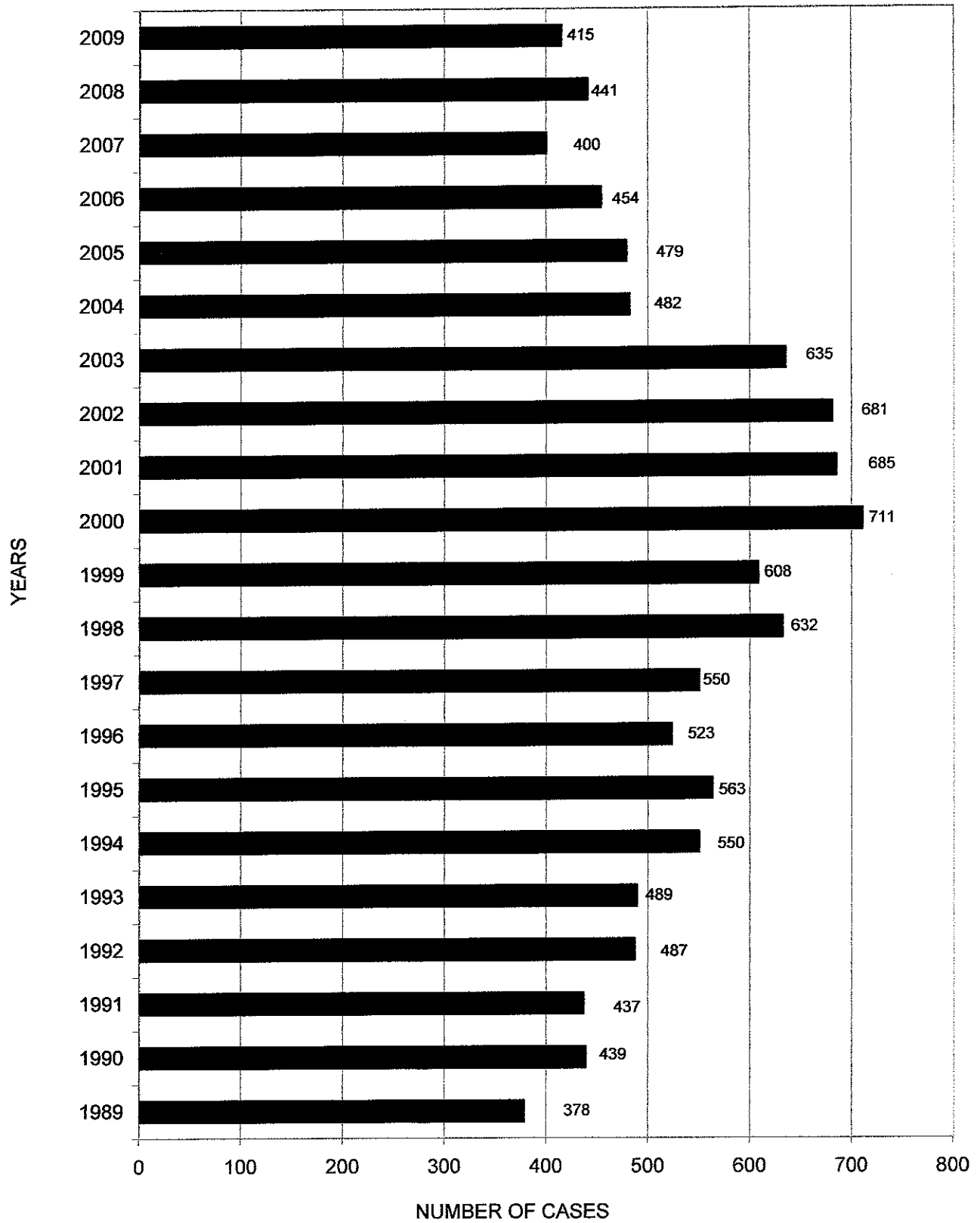

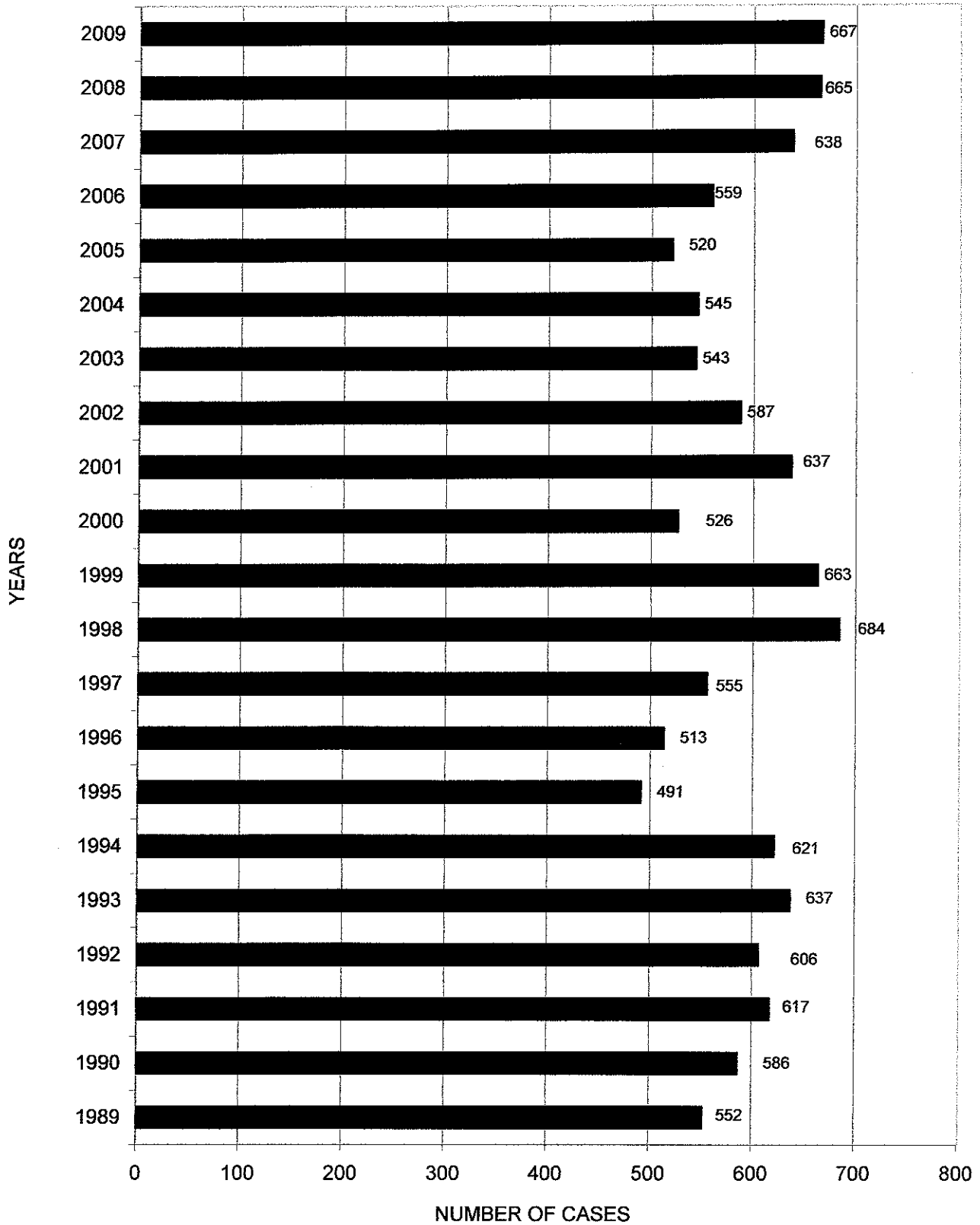

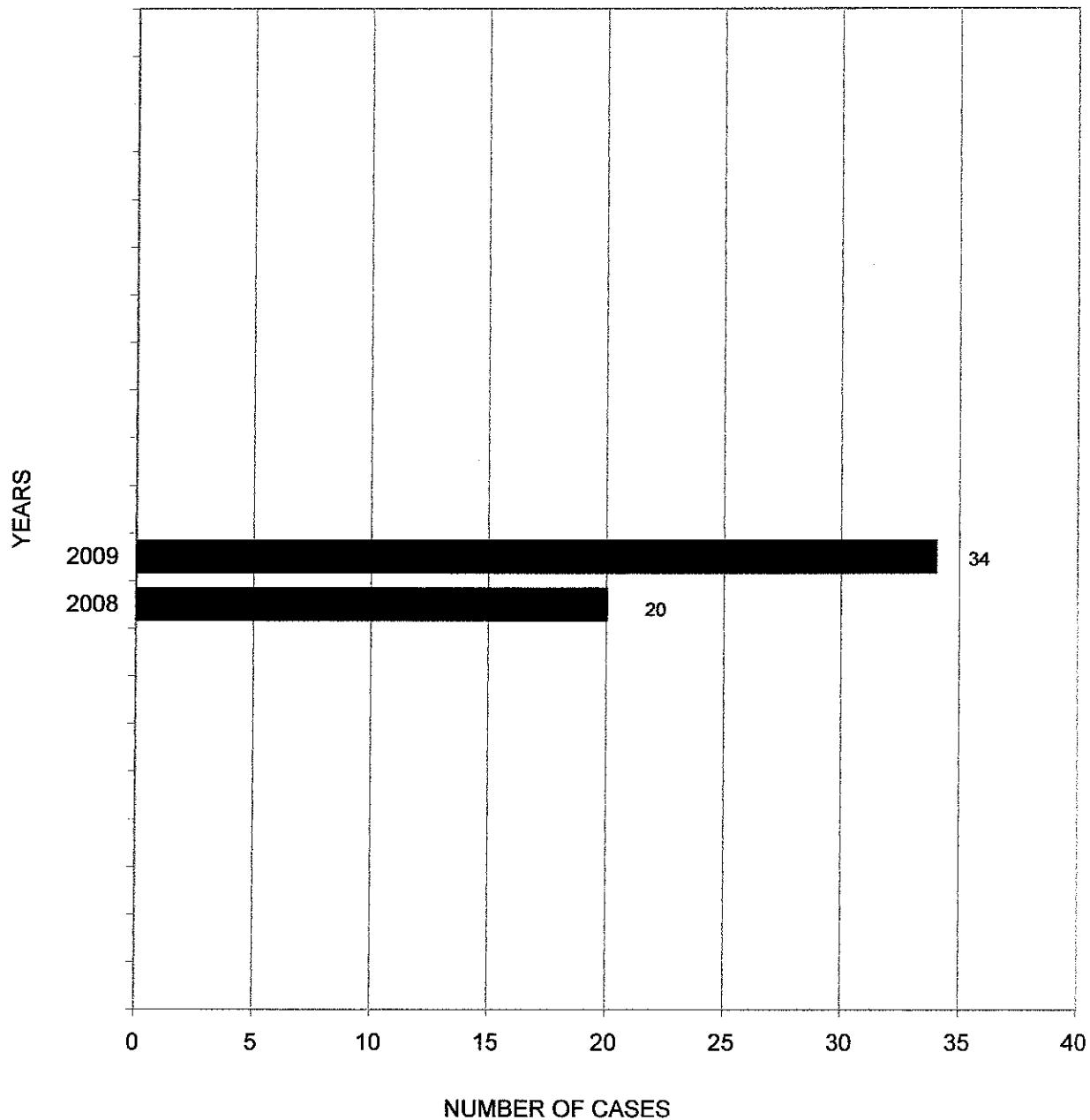
NEW CANCER CASES BY YEAR MERCY MEDICAL CENTER



NEW CANCER CASES BY YEAR ST ELIZABETH HOSPITAL

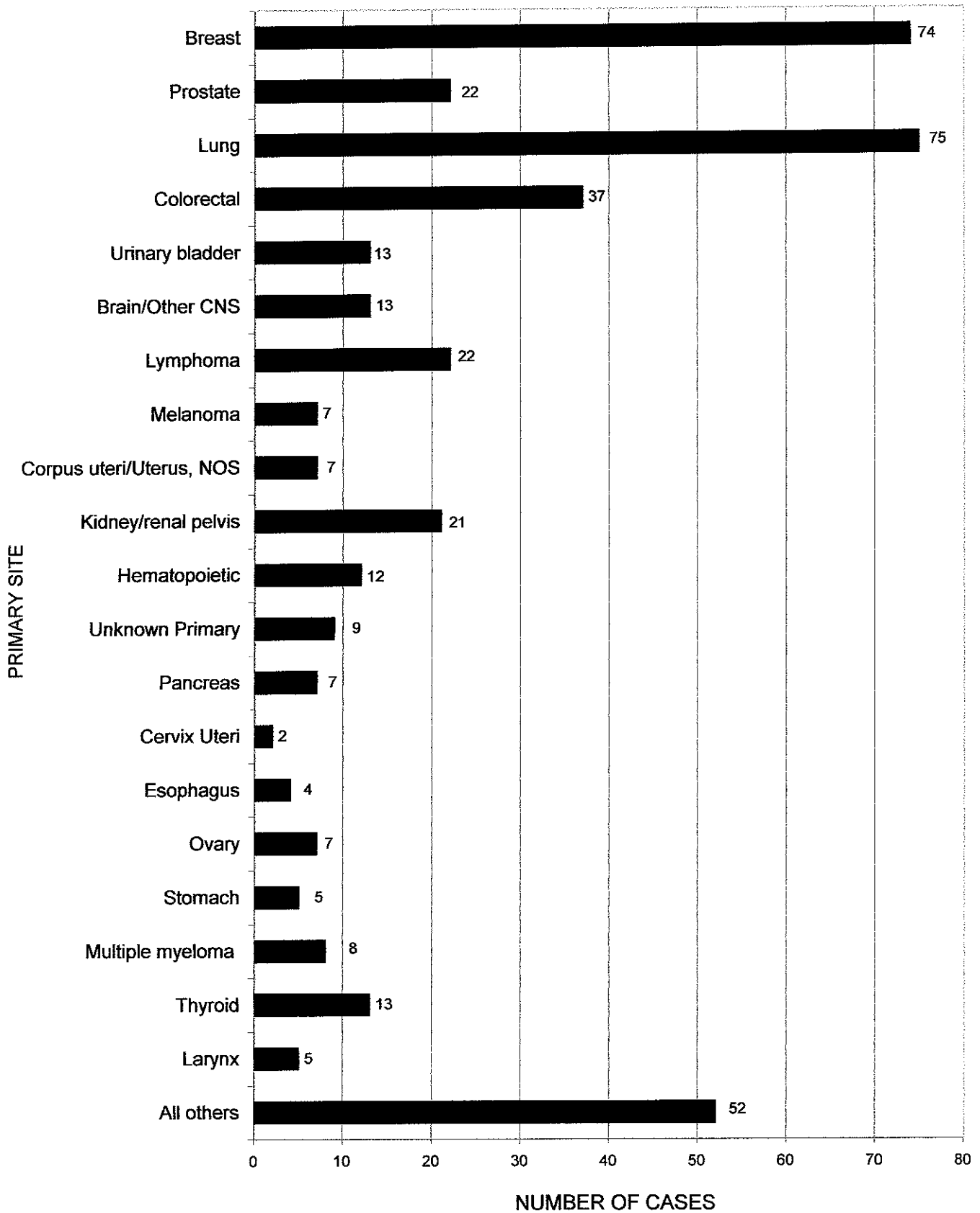


NEW CANCER CASES BY YEAR CALUMET HOSPITAL

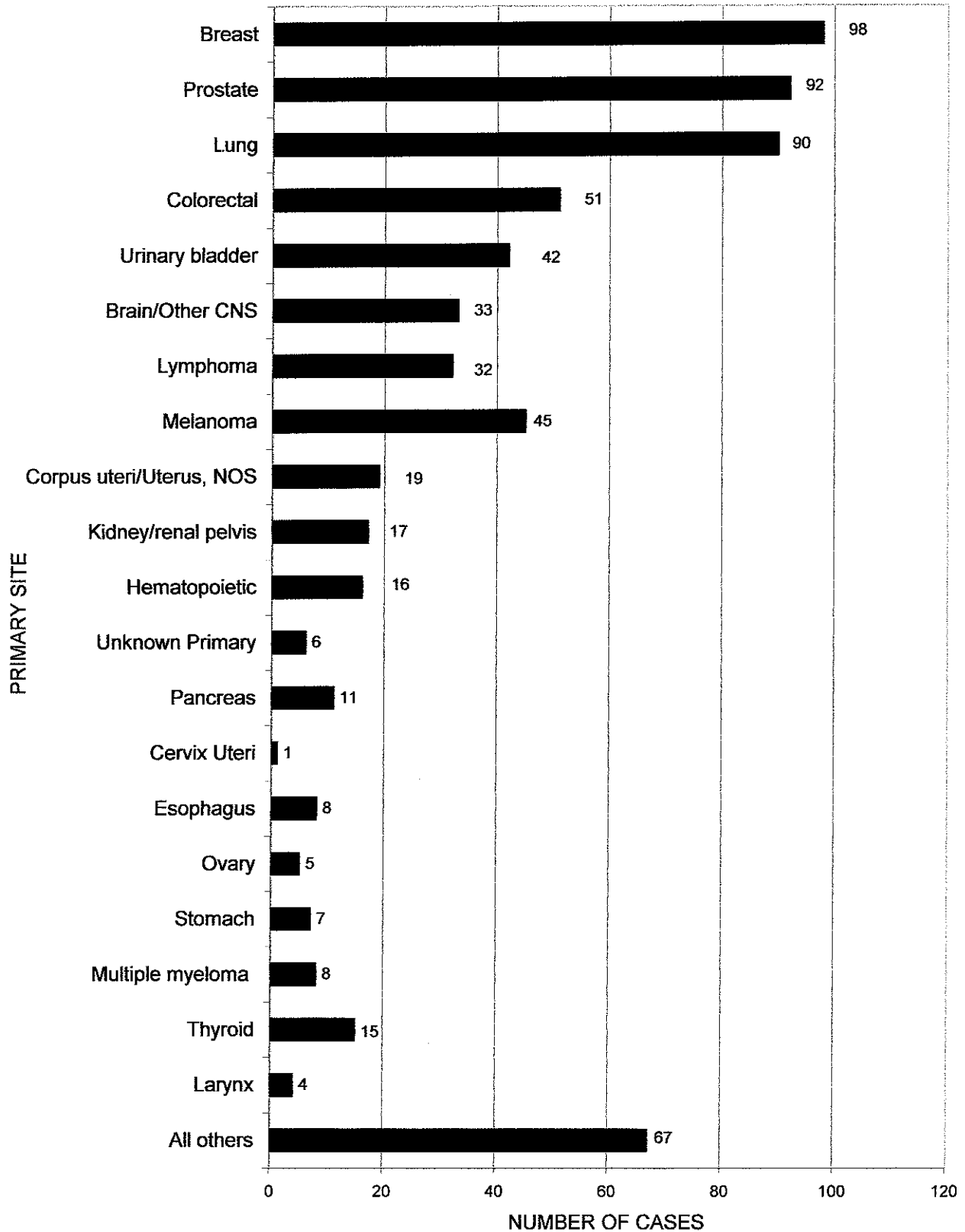

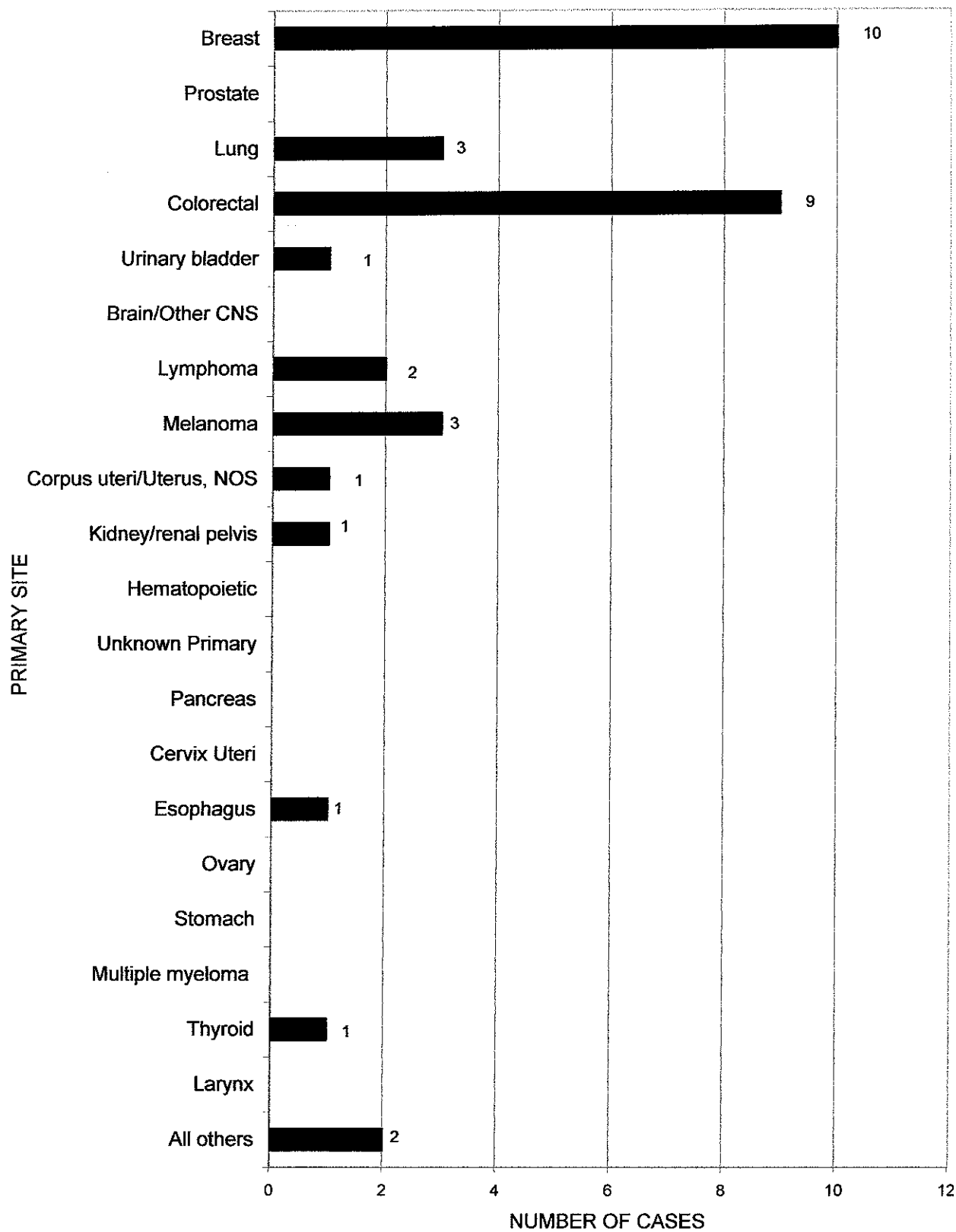
**DISTRIBUTION OF CANCER

MERCY MEDICAL CENTER (415 CASES)**



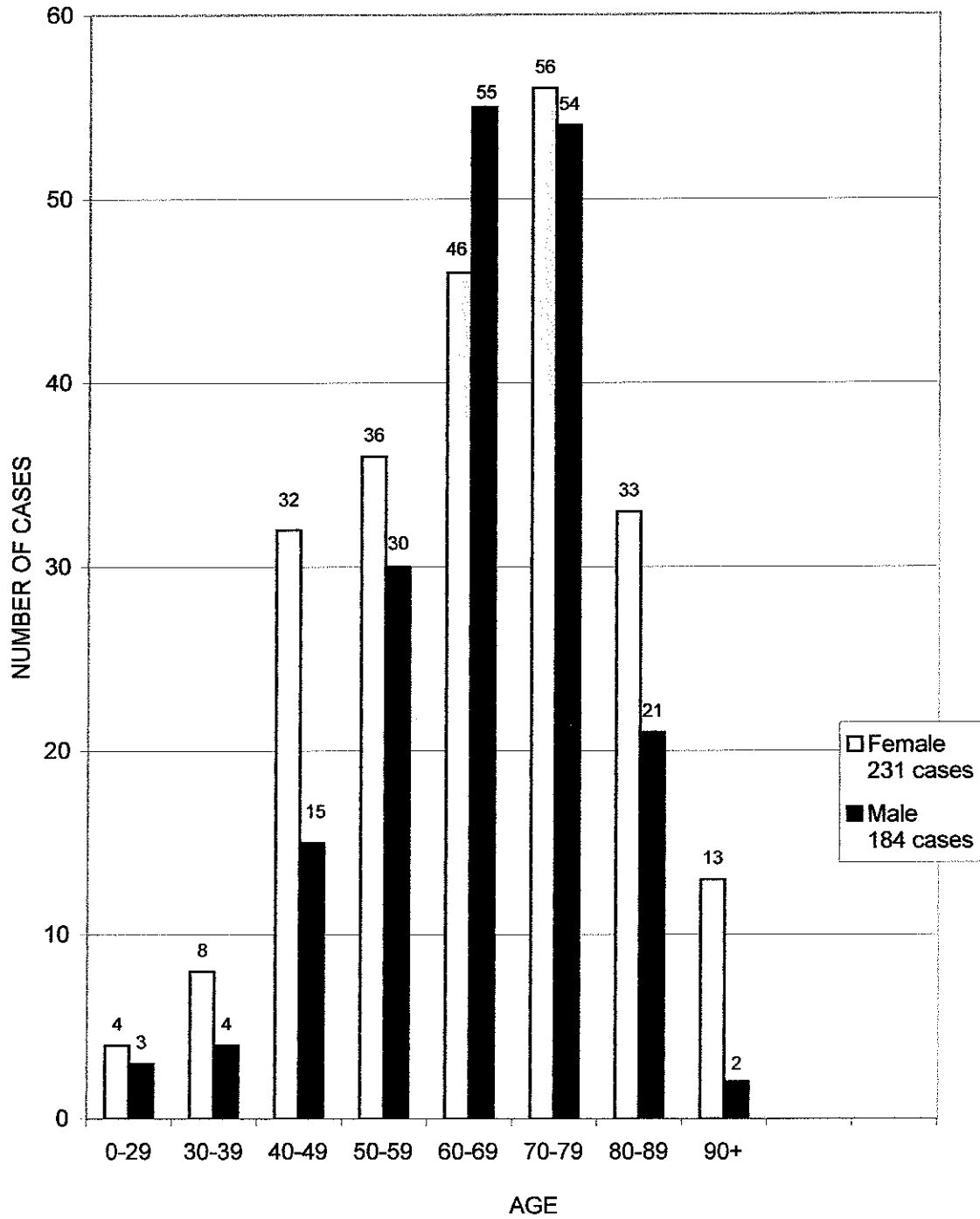
**DISTRIBUTION OF CANCER

ST ELIZABETH HOSPITAL (667 CASES)**



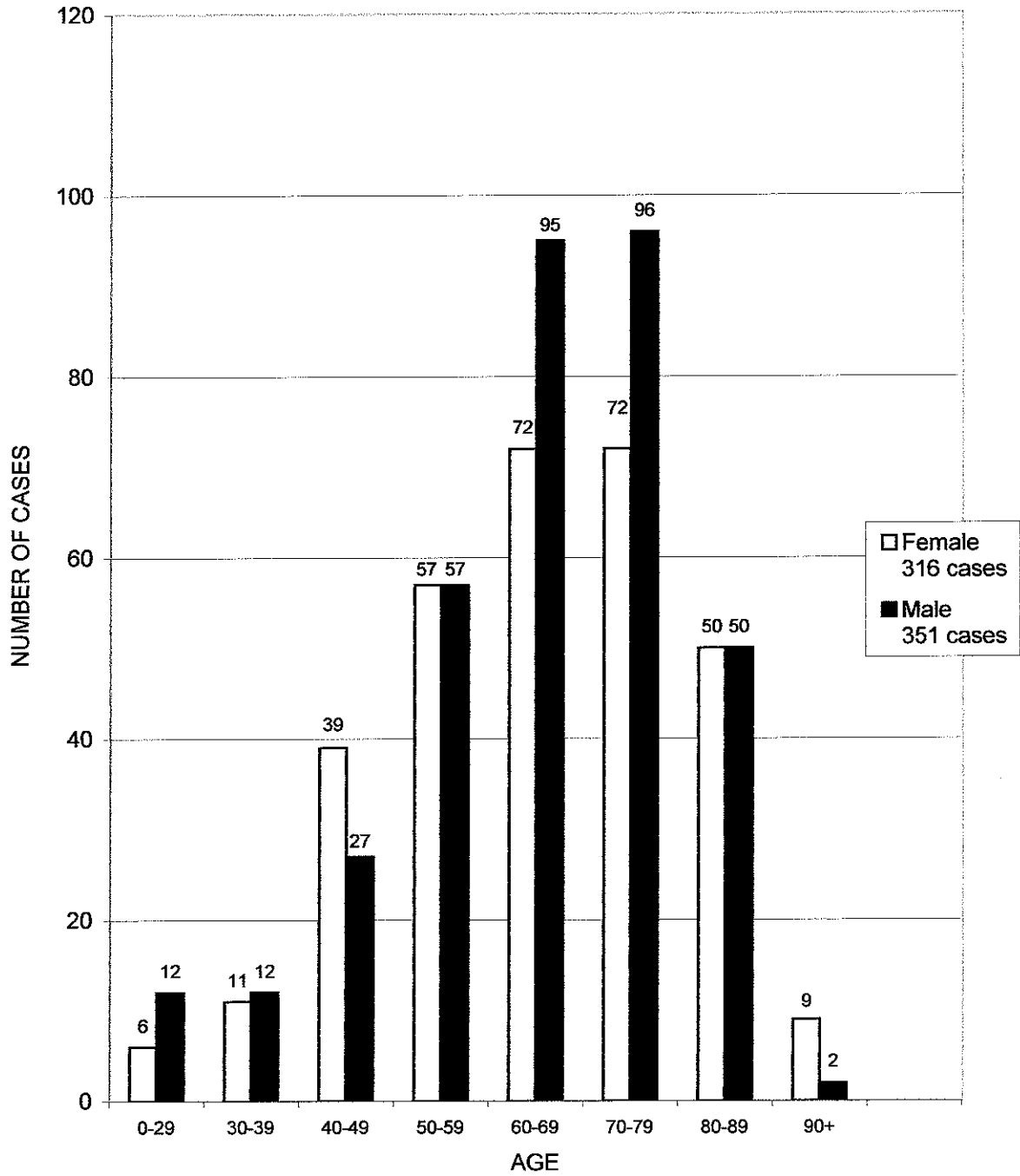
DISTRIBUTION OF CANCER BY PRIMARY SITE CALUMET HOSPITAL (34 CASES)



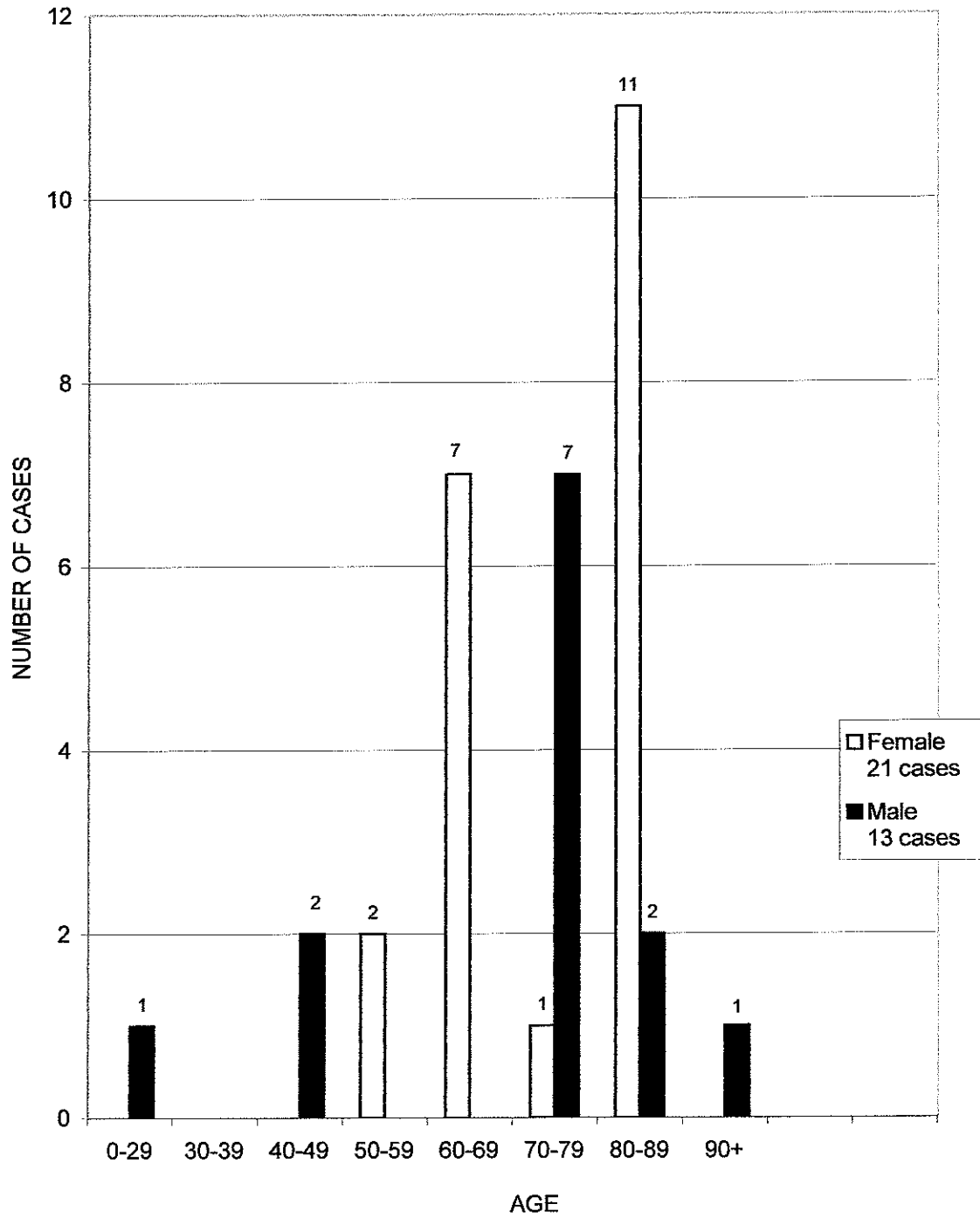
DISTRIBUTION OF CANCER BY AGE AND GENDER MERCY MEDICAL CENTER

Lung Cancer at Affinity Health System

Affinity Health System LUNG CANCER - 2009

Lung cancer has a huge impact on U.S. mortality. An estimated 222,520 new cases of lung cancer are expected in 2010. Lung cancer accounts for more deaths than any other cancer in both men and women. An estimated 157,300 deaths are expected to occur in 2010.

Significant improvements have occurred in the management of lung cancer over the past decade. One of the most widely studied approaches to the field of cancer, particularly lung cancer, is treatment strategies incorporating new agents and novel combinations. Treatment options are determined by the type and stage of the cancer. Screening for early lung cancer detection has not yet been proven to reduce mortality. Detection by chest x-ray, analysis of cells in sputum, and fiber-optic examination of the bronchial passages has shown limited effectiveness in reducing lung cancer deaths. New tests have produced promising results in detecting lung cancers at earlier, more operable stages in high-risk patients, but have not yet been shown to reduce lung cancer deaths.

Affinity Health System co-sponsored a Lung Cancer Symposium in April of 2010. Presentations highlighted on the Role of Radiation in the Management of Patients with Lung Cancer, the Surgical Perspective, Epidermal Growth Factor Receptor (EGFR) Inhibition and concluded with Palliative Care, Hospice Care.

In addition, the Cancer Committee reviewed all 2009 analytical lung cancer cases. One hundred forty-five cases were reviewed. At Affinity, the age at diagnosis of lung cancer is comparable to national statistics, with the majority of cases being diagnosed in the sixth and seventh decades (*graph 1*). There is a prevalence of Stage I and Stage IV disease at diagnosis both at Affinity Health System and nationally (*graph 2*). One-year survival of lung cancer at Mercy Medical Center is 51%; survival at ST Elizabeth Hospital is slightly higher at 56%, which compares to the National Cancer Database survival of all lung cancer at 51%. Calumet Hospital had no survivors at the end of one year, the small number of cases would account for this. There were no late-stage survivors, which correlates with national statistics (*graph 3 and graph 4*).

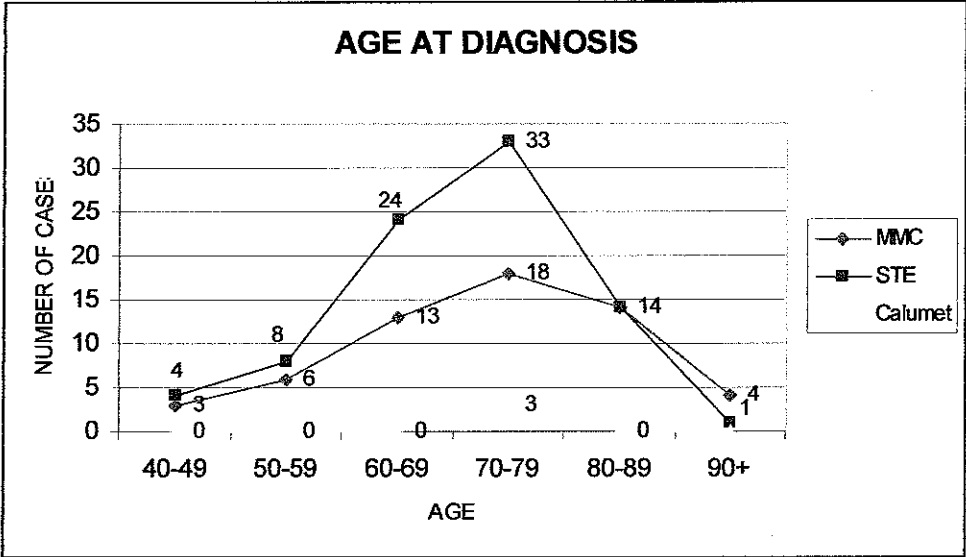
Cigarette smoking is by far the most important risk factor for lung cancer. Affinity Health System offers a nicotine cessation program, in which patients are referred to. We will continue to encourage our primary care specialists to provide cessation alternatives to all smoking patients. Affinity Health System continues to set an example by maintaining our workplace as 100% smoke free.

The pillars of Affinity Health System's Palliative Care Program are Advance care planning, Pain and symptom management, Care of the caregivers. Affinity Health System promotes referrals of patients to both Palliative Care and Hospice; this has become a focus of the Cancer Services Strategic Planning Committee.

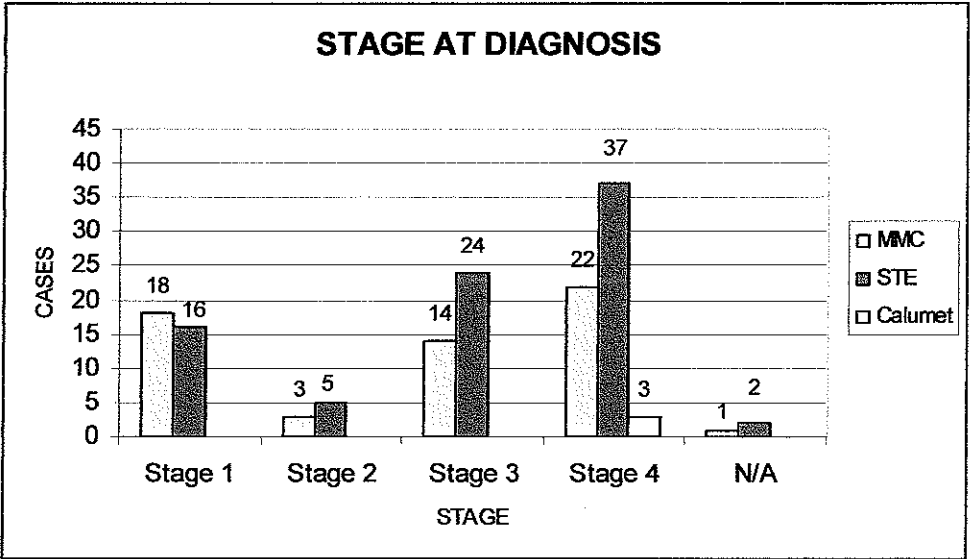

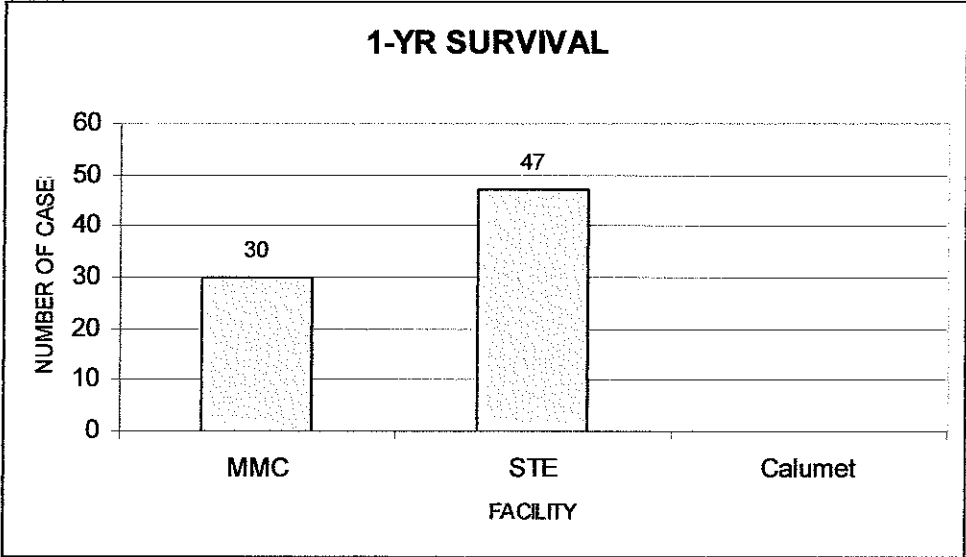
